Why We Do What We Do

I was once told by a very dear friend that: "You Episcopalians relike a parade." She was referring to how we process in at the beginning of the service and process out at the conclusion of the service. The entrance procession at the beginning of the service is very symbolic. It reminds us that we are pilgrims on a journey together. It also symbolizes Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. There is a specific order to the procession: The cross always leads the procession and reminds us of Christ's victory over sin and death. If incense is used, the Thurifer carries a Thurible with burning incense in it. If incense it not used. Two acolytes, with lighted candle follow behind the cross. They are lighting the way for the remainder of the procession. If there is choir or music leader, they follow the Acolytes. They are usually robed and assist the congregation in singing the processional hymn. An LEM will follow the choir with the Book of the Gospels elevated above his/her head. Other assistants will follow or if there is only one assistant a deacon will be next, followed by the priest. A bishop is last. A special note, only the Book of the Gospels is carried in the procession, not a lectionary. It contains the official liturgical text of the Gospels, which are already divided according to the year and seasons of the year. It is placed upon the altar until needed and then carried between candles and the cross to a place in the center of the congregation. Its reading is reserved for those ordained, and all stand while it is being read. The recession, at the end of the service, reverses the order, with the cross going first, and the priest of bishop last.

Ingredients: -4 Boneless Skinless Chicken Breasts -2Tbsp Butter

-Salt & Pepper to taste - 2tsp Italian Seasoning - 1 juice of Lemon

- 1 cup uncooked Rice - 2 ¼ cup Chicken Broth

Directions: Melt butter over medium heat in a large skillet or pan (one that has a lid). Season chicken with salt and pepper to taste, and Italian seasoning. Brown chicken in the butter for 1-2 minutes on each side. (Chicken shouldn't be cooked through at this point) Transfer chicken to a plate. Add rice, chicken broth, lemon juice, and remaining Italian seasoning to the pan (no need to clean it first). Place chicken on top, then cover and simmer over medium-low heat for 20-25 minutes until liquid is dissolved. Garnish with fresh parsley or cilantro if desired and lemon wedges for squeezing. Serve immediately.

- If you are cooking with **bone-in. skin-on chicken breasts**, up the browning time to about 3-4 minutes per side before removing to add the rice and broth. Be sure to check that the chicken has reached an internal temperature of 165 degrees before eating.
- If you are using brown rice, you'll need to up the cooking time to about 30-35 minutes. Check around the 30-minute mark for doneness.
- Some great add-ins to this recipe include one can of fire-roasted tomatoes, half a cup of frozen peas or carrots, one teaspoon of red pepper flakes, or add half a finely chopped onion to the butter to caramelize a bit before adding chicken.
- This chicken and rice recipe will keep for up to 3 days in the fridge or up to 3 months in the freezer in an airtight container.
