Why Do We Do What We Do?

Episcopal worship is rich in scriptural understanding, tradition, symbolism, and ceremony. Still, we recognize that it can sometimes be daunting! When and why do we stand or kneel? When and why do we bow or genuflect? When the processional cross passes by us, we bow our heads out of respect for what the cross symbolizes-our Lord's death on the cross. We make the sign of the cross, with the opening acclamation: Blessed be God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. And blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen. During the Liturgy of the Word, we sit for the Old Testament Lesson, Psalm, and Epistle. The response to the lessons, ("Thanks be to God"), is our way of giving thanks for the wisdom and teaching which is imparted to us by there words. The Gospel is the word of Christ, so we stand out of respect. When the Gospel is announced, we may make three signs of the cross: one on our forehead, one on our lips, and one on our heart. We do this is to remind ourselves that the Gospel must be understood by our (head), proclaimed (lips), and believed (heart). But the most ancient way of making the sign of the cross is the one where I trace the cross on your forehead with my thumb. This has very ancient roots dating back to the early Christians.

Ignatius (July 31st) had a reputation as a well-known warrior. In one battle, he was struck by a cannonball, and his legs were badly injured. While he healed, Ignatius had a conversion of heart. He began to read books about Christ and the lives of the saints, and his prayer life deepened. He began a new way of life, and followed God's will for him. He gave away his possessions, begged for food, and practiced spiritual exercises, recording everything in a journal. This helped him to better understand God, and in turn he educated others in the faith. He accepted the role as leader of the Society of Jesus. Before his death, he had established 35 schools. St. Ignatius is the patron of soldiers and educators.

Jam Packed July

July 1, 1862 - President Abraham Lincoln signed the first income tax bill, levying a 3% income tax on annual incomes of \$600-\$10,000 and a 5% tax on incomes over \$10,000. Also on this day, the Bureau of Internal Revenue was established by an Act of Congress.

July 4, 1863- Vicksburg, the last Confederate stronghold on the Mississippi River, surrendered to General Grant and the Army of the West after a six week siege. With the Union in control of the Mississippi, the Confederacy was effectively split in two, cut off from its western allies.

July 8, 1776 - The first public reading of the Declaration of Independence occurred as Colonel John Nixon read it to an assembled crowd in Philadelphia.

July 12, 1943 - During World War II, in the Battle of Kursk, the largest tank battle in history took place outside the small village of Prohorovka, Russia. About nine hundred Russian tanks attacked an equal number of German tanks fighting at close range. When Hitler ordered a cease-fire, 300 German tanks remained strewn over the battlefield.

July 16, 1769 - San Diego was founded as the mission San Diego de Alcala by Father Junipero Serra.


July 22, 1934 - Bank robber John Dillinger (1902-1934) was shot and killed by FBI agents as he left Chicago's Biograph Movie Theater after watching the film *Manhattan Melodrama*.

July 24, 1943 - During World War II in Europe, the Royal Air Force conducted Operation Gomorrah, raiding Hamburg, while tossing bales of aluminum foil strips overboard to cause German radar screens to see a blizzard of false echoes. As a result, only twelve of 791 Allied bombers involved were shot down.

July 27, 1953 - The Korean War ended with the signing of an armistice by U.S. and North Korean delegates at Panmunjom, Korea. The war had lasted just over three years.

Ingredients: 1 purchased Angel food cake, cut into bite-sized pieces 32oz sweetened vanilla yogurt divided -1pint strawberries, sliced, divided 3/4c strawberry preserves -1-2tbsp water, more as needed - 2c. blueberries, rinsed & dried -3/4c blueberry preserves -whole strawberries & blueberries for garnish.

Directions: Place a layer of angel food cake pieces in the bottom of a small trifle dish or pretty cut-glass bowl. Spread a thin layer of yogurt over cake layer. Add a single layer of sliced strawberries. Place strawberry preserves and 1 tablespoon water in a microwave-safe bowl and heat on High until preserves liquefy, 1 to 2 minutes. Stir, and add up to 1 tablespoon more water if needed to make a syrup. Drizzle a portion of strawberry syrup over strawberry layer. Add another single layer of cake pieces and spread with yogurt. Sprinkle with blueberries. Place blueberry preserves and 1 tablespoon water in a microwave-safe bowl and heat on High until preserves have melted, about 1 minute. Stir, and add up to 1 tablespoon more water if needed to make a syrup. Drizzle a portion of blueberry syrup over blueberries. Add another layer of cake pieces; spread with yogurt, add a layer of strawberries, and drizzle with strawberry syrup. Add a layer of cake; spread with yogurt, sprinkle with blueberries, and drizzle with blueberry syrup. Spread with a final layer of yogurt. Garnish with fresh strawberry slices, whole berries, and blueberries, and drizzle with any remaining syrup. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve. Store leftovers, covered, in the refrigerator.
